Cohesion Requires Partnership

Civil society statement in support of strong partnership provisions in the general regulation on the Structural and Cohesion funds for 2007-2013

[Article 10 of the proposed regulation COM(2004)492]

A broad alliance of European social and environmental civil society organisations is deeply concerned about the proposed weakening of provisions on partnership (Article 10) in the new general regulation on the Structural and Cohesion Funds for 2007-2013. The wording suggested in the Council Presidency compromise (of 2 August 2005) seriously dilutes the partnership principle in comparison with not only the Commission's original proposal, but also with the current regulation 1260/1999.

Partnership refers to the inclusion of a broad range of stakeholders, such as non-governmental organisations (NGOs), regional, local and other authorities in the programming, implementation and monitoring of the Structural and Cohesion Funds programmes. Partnership has proved to be a key to success in the Structural and Cohesion Funds programmes and its weakening would be an unfortunate step back.

The **European Parliament**, in its resolution on the general regulation of 6 July 2005, "*rejects any weakening of the principle of partnership as envisaged in the original proposal, especially in terms of strategic planning and monitoring of the programmes; calls particularly for the maintenance of the list of appropriate bodies (Article 10(1)(c));*"

We support the Parliament's recommendation and call on Member States in the Council to make sure that the partnership provisions in Article 10 of the general regulation are not weakened.

7 reasons for stronger partnership:

- 1) Partnership leads to improved absorption of the funds, and more effective use of European taxpayer's money, through better selection of projects according to their quality
- 2) Partnership improves transparency and prevents misuse and corruption
- 3) Partnership contributes to a democratic and participative political culture
- 4) Partnership improves coordination through wider dissemination of information
- 5) Partnership strengthens both society's sense of ownership of the projects funded and the legitimacy of the cohesion policy
- 6) At a time when legitimacy of EU policies and efficiency of its expenditure are seriously debated, partnership in cohesion policy needs to be strengthened, not weakened.
- 7) Given the size of the cohesion policy budget and the trend towards decentralisation of financial control, partnership needs to be strengthened, not weakened.

Therefore, we urge the Council to adopt the Commission's original wording or make the following adjustments in the Council Presidency text:
